## **OGEHR Trillium Grant**

We announced through the email tree the successful application to the Ontario Trillium Foundation of a Resilient Communities Grant. Clapper Chatter, though, allows a better opportunity to fill you in on the details.

You may or may not know that the Development Committee was re-introduced this year. One of the first areas that they looked into were grants that might be available to OGEHR. The Ontario Trillium Foundation Resilient Communities Fund seemed like a good match. The description is "... funding to help your non-profit organization rebuild from the impacts of COVID-19 ..."

That sounded just like us!

As with many organizations during the pandemic, our membership numbers have decreased. We have been looking for ways to reengage our membership—the Virtual Christmas Concert, our continued monthly bell socials with Marg, the Annual Meeting Concert—so application was put together to purchase a number of handchime sets and loan them to non OGEHR groups as an incentive to join OGEHR. After the completion of this project all of these sets will be available to members through our instrument loan program.

The groups will be participating in a one day mini-festival on March 4th, 2023. To accommodate getting groups together from across the province the mini-festival will be a hybrid live/virtual

event. The members of each group will be in the same location, but the groups will all be connected virtually with each other to perform together. At the mini-festival groups will rehearse

and perform a couple of massed pieces. In addition each group will record in advance a performance of their choosing on the loaned instrument. All of these recordings will be put together and presented later in a Trillium Handchime Loan Project concert.

Through the grant we were also able to purchase and gift to the participating groups the copies of the massed pieces. And a very exciting aspect of the program is that each group will have an OGEHR clinician available to help prepare them for the mini-festival! We are pleased to be able to announce that Stuart Sladden will be the guest conductor for the minifestival! You may remember Stuart from our last festival. Just as a reminder, here is a little more info about Stuart:

Stuart Sladden has completed a Doctor of Music degree in Choral Conducting from the University of Alberta. He currently sings with the Winnipeg Singers, conducts the Bison Men's Chorus, the Rochester Ringers, and the U of M Concert Choir, teaches at the Faculty of Music at University of Manitoba and at the International Music Camp, and is the Vice President of the Manitoba Choral Association.

I always say to my students "You never know until you ask." We looked into and asked for a grant to



help revitalize OGEHR. It was surprising and exciting to have the grant come through! It has provided a new opportunity for us to engage new members and will provide a benefit to all members in the future.

We will continue to look for new opportunities to provide to the members of OGEHR!

### Sylvia Carscadden

Sylvia Carscadden's handbell story is one of enthusiasm, initiative, determination and dedication. These qualities, combined with a passion for music and generosity of time and talent, shaped Sylvia's remarkable contributions to handbell education and ringing in Ontario, particularly in the Sudbury area.

Sylvia grew up in Oshawa, Ontario where her music education began with pre-school piano lessons from her mother. Sylvia became a competent pianist. A few of her

maxims reflect her philosophy of making music: 'Play-practice-repeat'; 'Learn to be your best'; 'Learn from each other'; 'There is nothing better than making music with friends'; 'Enjoy the applause'; and, to quote Don Allured, "The right note at the right time is just the beginning!". Sylvia encouraged her musicians that rehearsing was not enough and to seek opportunities to perform. After a performance, Sylvia could be heard to say "Oh, that was so good! I am so proud of you!"

Sylvia's first handbell opportunity came when her mother, Mary Black, gifted Sylvia's family with a three octave set of bells that had belonged to Mary's friend, Mrs. Richardson, in Peterborough. Mary had previously heard Mrs. Richardson's daughter ring, loved the sound, and encouraged, even 'pestered', Sylvia to ring. But, with mother and bells in Peterborough and Sylvia now in Sudbury with four children, the bells sat, little used for some time. However, Mrs. Richardson would come over when Sylvia's family visited Peterborough to demonstrate ringing from a hymn book. On her own, Sylvia worked through the learning packages that accompanied the bells.

And then... the Wesley Bell Ringers from Christ United Methodist Church, Salt Lake City, gave a concert in Sudbury. Sylvia, whose interest in bells had already been piqued, requested to billet the director. Sylvia absorbed all she could from him while daughter Susan watched, listened, and became intrigued with 4-in-hand. The Carscadden family was 'into' bells.

To expand her experience, Sylvia attended Bay View Week of Handbells, in Petoskey, Michigan, where director Donald Allured reinforced her love of the instrument and her high standards. Sylvia describes this experience as life-changing. She loved the place, the atmosphere, the bells – everything, and soaked it all up "like a sponge." True to her desire to learn and experience all things handbell, Sylvia challenged herself to play bass bells in 'the pit' at Bell View. For several years she and her daughter Susan played on the same table—C3 — G3!!

The Carscadden children and their friends formed Sylvia's first handbell choir. As these children grew up, others would join. In 1975, Sylvia formed the community choir, 'Kampana', meaning bells in Filipino. This choir practiced at the Carscadden home in Lively, a small town just west of Sudbury. During the cold, snowy winters of Northern Ontario, Sylvia would drive out to see if road conditions were clear enough for the ringers to make it down to the house. If not, practice was cancelled.

The Kampana choir and quartet were uniquely neither church nor school sponsored or associated. They were a community choir that defined 'community choir'. Their concert at the beginning of December each year marked the start of Christmas celebrations for many Lively residents. Admission was a gift to the food bank. Through their performances at schools, churches, fundraisers, dinners and meetings, Kampana spread their love of bells and were able to support many not-for-profit organizations. It was common practice for the choir to ask a young musician to perform at their concerts and young people were encouraged to try the bells after a concert. The choir gave workshops on chimes for elementary teachers and were instrumental in the creation of chime choirs in area schools and churches.

Con't...

In 1985, Kampana attended the first OGEHR festival, organized by Barb Plante and Laudamus Ringers, in London, Ontario. The choir played 'Overture to Carmen' at the festival and rented a sports team bus from Laurentian University for the five hour drive there and back. This began a pattern of attending the biennial OGEHR festivals. Purchasing new, more complex and varied music from the music displays, playing with others, attending workshops, plus meeting and being directed by handbell composers themselves made the festivals an invaluable learning tool for Sylvia and the choir. Fundraising to attend festivals included playing at weddings, dinners and churches. Ringers who were teachers took personal days in order to attend the entire festival. This was a closely knit, dedicated group—renowned for their late-night parties!

Sylvia was the Festival Coordinator for the Hamilton OGEHR Festival in 2011 at McMaster University, Hamilton. After attending many Festival Committee meetings in the south, Sylvia invited the committee to make the 5 hour drive north to Sudbury for their spring meeting. How would anyone guess that significant snow would fall the night before the meeting - in May? All members made the meeting - with stories to tell!

Sylvia and Kampana also broadened their experience by attending International Festivals. Sylvia sat on the planning committee of their first, the Toronto International Festival in 2004. In 2008, Sylvia and daughters Barbara and Susan played at the Orlando

international Festival, where Susan was also the Canadian conductor. Sylvia commissioned Carl Wiltse to write a solo piece for Susan in honour of the occasion. The final International Festival that Kampana attended was in Vancouver in 2016. There, the Carscadden women, Sylvia and her three daughters, Susan, Barb and Janine, played with Nikki Atwell's choir, Alleluia Ringers.

After Vancouver, with members moving away and practice space not ideal, Kampana dispersed. Their final performance in Sudbury was playing the bells in Benjamin Britten's community opera, *Noah's Flood*. An era had come to an end.

The bells and equipment were sent to daughter Janine in Armstrong, BC. Janine, who is currently president of the BC Guild, has fittingly continued the choir name Kampana. Susan currently directs the Bellessima quartet and Bells Ablaze choir in Ingersoll, Ontario, and Barbara plays in a small church in Texas. Although the Carscadden grandchildren did not continued the handbell playing tradition, they assisted at many Kampana concerts and were always proud when Grandma visited their schools with her bells for a performance or 'show and tell'.

The inaugural Joan Mantle Music Trust Community Award was awarded to Sylvia in 2014 for her impact on the community of Sudbury. This award recognized Sylvia's passion for music education for all ages, her promotion of lifelong music education and her inspiration to others. Sylvia has also been honoured with the designation Honorary Fellow by Huntington University in Sudbury, and OGEHR honoured Sylvia as an Honorary Member in 2015 for her outstanding personal participation and exceptional leadership in handbell ringing in Ontario.

Sylvia is a remarkable woman with a love of music and a gift for sharing her passion with others. The music community of Sudbury and the handbell community in Ontario are fortunate to have shared and benefitted from decades of Sylvia's commitment to music and music education. We are all richer for it. Thank you Sylvia.

### A Single Thread by Tracy Chevalier



After both her brother and fiancé are killed during WW1, 38-year-old Violet Speedwell, pieces together a life for herself by moving to the town of Winchester, home to one of England's grandest cathedrals. There, Violet develops friendships with two groups: "broderers" and bell ringers.

Broderers are women who embroider kneelers for the Cathedral. In-depth knowledge about embroidery is woven into the friendships Violet develops as she moves from novice to expert.

A secondary but well developed theme is that of bell ringing in cathedral towers. The reader learns how ringers weave together intervals and sequences to create change ringing—where the striking succession of the bells is changed, to give variety and musicality to the sound.

This novel, while touching on the joys and sorrows of both family and friendship, captures the historical essence of the period between WW1 and WW2.
